



There was a large number of returning staff (13) who were experienced, enthusiastic, very committed to our Lord, and used to working as a team. The staff and counselors oversaw a total of 343 campers.

The theme "Jesus, The Bread of Life" served as a basis for a week of spiritual growth, fellowship, and community building. The campers also participated in the planned events of crafts, canoeing, archery, team sports, swimming, and the ropes course. Building, a new event, was added for the first time this year. Junior and Senior campers built benches and a towel tree by the swimming hole and canoe racks by the river. These additions remind us daily of summer camp and can be used and enjoyed by all who come to DaySpring.

DaySpring looks forward with great anticipation for Summer Camp 1990. The sessions will begin on July 8 and conclude August 10, 1990. With the completion of Bishop Haynes Lodge the camp will be able to accommodate more campers than in the past.

Sharing is a column that will be featured regularly. I will be sharing with you a variety of things about DaySpring, stories that I feel are enjoyable. This first Sharing Column is about Jim and Jamie Cox.

Married for five years last April, Jimmy and I met when he remodeled a bank where I was working as a teller. We dated for three years and "Tied the knot" in a grand ceremony at St. James United Methodist Church in St. Petersburg, Florida.

We bought an old house with aspirations of years of renovations. But, like the cobbler's son having no shoes—the contractors house got very little attention and by the way, I never balanced the checkbook.

I continued in my banking career with the hope of successfully climbing the corporate ladder. Also, during this time, Jimmy and I were actively seeking a church family. Jimmy, while still in the construction business, was looking at a prospective job in North St. Petersburg. The job was right across the street from Holy Cross Episcopal Church. For the record, Jimmy never got the job, but we did get our church family. I started confirmation classes and in December, 1986, I was confirmed by Bishop Haynes. Not too far down the road, Jimmy became a member of the DaySpring Board.

Under the guidance of Bishop Haynes, Jimmy continued to become involved with the Diocese and DaySpring. I attempted to try and comprehend the Episcopal Church. Understand, I was baptized and raised a Methodist and this was a new ballgame for me. A winning ballgame, but I still had a few innings to go.

By this time, I was the manager of a branch bank in Clearwater. Under the direction of Father Harry Williams, rector of St. Anne of Grace, Jimmy started the process of the Deaconate Program. He was accepted as

a postulant. Together we proceeded anxiously to do our work within the church.

Oh, yes, they can: hurray, love it, happy, wonderful staff, wonderful camp, wonderful life, etc. etc. Also we do work, we minister to the Center and serve all the groups that enter into the camp. It's challenging, rewarding, but best of all it's serving our Diocese and our Lord.

Our home is the Hall House, located at the Center down by the river. We happily share it with some close family pets and other wild life that live in the very near vicinity.

Our prayers for DaySpring are answered daily. Summer camp was a great success. The new construction, Bishop Haynes Lodge, is near completion and our schedule for the rest of 1989 and 1990 is exciting.

However, to move in the direction of a program committee would seem logical, understanding that the Center will accommodate 150 people when the lodge is completed. That makes DaySpring certainly large enough to do some very good programming. The Bishop sees himself playing the role as the idea person. For example, he has been told by clergy in several different parishes that he has been in, that they have a large number of lapse members.

Many of these are people who are not active in the parish or mission, but have not joined another church. They're just staying at home. Bishop Harris believes it takes a very special training to minister to these individuals. Training for both the lay visitors and clergy to reach out. If this is a need in the Diocese, he would like to see DaySpring and a program committee fulfill it.

In discussing with Bishop Harris the new building and the physical facilities at DaySpring, he felt the next step could be towards recreation. His suggestion for both young people and adults, would be a swimming pool and personally feels tennis courts would be great.

We at DaySpring look forward to many fruitful years under the leadership of Bishop Harris.
